What stops us from changing the system?

Fear. Greed. Power. Control.

Those who gain power inside the system often want to reshape it in their own image -- but only by moving the same broken pieces around. True change means something deeper.

Let's be clear: the system must be destroyed and rebuilt from the bottom up.

### ### A Reimagined World

I believe food, clothing, shelter, healthcare, and education should be free.

- **Homes for all**: 200-square-foot bachelor pads for individuals; up to 400-square-foot homes for families.

- **Free primary and post-secondary education**.

- **Healthcare for everyone**: dental, eye, audiology, mental health, addiction services, prescriptions, therapy, preventative care, emergency care.

- **Free groceries**: a weekly ration of basics, including hygiene products, diapers, and formula, with the option to buy more.
- **Free clothing**: seasonal basics and outerwear, especially in cold climates.

How do we make this possible? By flattening the economy into a simple system of trade.

- Remove interest, taxes, stocks, depreciation, and appreciation.
- Make banks not-for-profit.
- Eliminate interest on existing loans and apply past payments back to the principal.
- Wipe out student loan debt.
- Take the cap off money itself: governments can create it freely, without taxing individuals first. Money is only a symbol of trade.

With this, every person receives a Universal Basic Income: a minimum of \$2,000 per month, plus \$500 per child. Work becomes a choice, not a requirement for survival. Government's only role: managing distribution.

Back in 2002, when I was pregnant with my daughter, sleep deprivation wasn't an option. I simply didn't function on just a few hours of broken sleep--it made me physically sick. I needed to get a full night's rest, or at least something close to it, most nights. But how?

Google was still new then, but it had content--even back then. I started searching for ways to avoid sleep deprivation while parenting a newborn. That's when I found attachment parenting. Dr. Sears was talking about co-sleeping, and after a little reading, I realized this could be my way around the exhaustion. I knew co-sleeping was normal in many places around the world--North America was the exception, not the rule. So, I decided I was going to co-sleep. After more reading to figure out how to do it safely, I set off on my co-sleeping journey.

Attachment parenting introduced me to extended breastfeeding, too. Co-sleeping and breastfeeding meant I didn't have to get up at night to make bottles or fuss with anything. I could sleep topless, just roll over, stick a boob in my daughter's mouth, and go right back to sleep. Brilliant. Another problem solved.

I was still pregnant at this point, though, so the question was: would my plans actually work?

Sitting here today, my daughter now 22, I can say confidently that they did.

Co-sleeping wasn't widely accepted back then. At the hospital, I got some pushback from the nurses because I wasn't willing to just let my daughter cry in the bassinet, nor was I willing to stay up all night comforting her alone. I wanted to sleep with her--and I did, despite their judgment.

Fortunately, I was only in the hospital for a couple of days before bringing her home. I set up the bassinet

as an extension of the bed, with one side pushed against the wall, and we both fell asleep nursing. I got a full night's rest, and she was content. That was all that mattered.

My daughter, especially as a small child, was extremely clingy. She didn't want a stroller--she wanted to be carried. Thank goodness baby-wearing and carriers were becoming popular. The crib I bought collected dust and became a very good laundry basket. The stroller sat empty. She wanted nothing to do with either.

I honored her clingy nature. I gave her all the attention she wanted. I didn't worry about spoiling her. I didn't worry that we'd still be sleeping together at 22 (we're not). I just knew I needed to give her what she needed--and that meant allowing her to be clingy until she didn't need to be anymore.

As it turned out, she slept with me until I became pregnant with my son in 2009. At that point, I explained--as much as a six-year-old can understand-- that she was going to have a little brother or sister, and she needed to make room for the baby, because I planned to do the same with them that I had done with her. She understood, and we worked on moving her into her own bed. I started with a mattress on the floor in my room and slowly moved it through the house until she was sleeping in her own room.

With my son, I began the exact same process of nursing and co-sleeping. But he wasn't clingy like my daughter. He quickly transitioned into a crib. To be honest, I wasn't even going to buy a crib since my daughter's had sat unused--but that's what he wanted, so I gave it to him.

Unlike my daughter, he wanted the stroller. He wanted to face outward and see the world. He wanted nothing to do with a baby carrier--and actually wanted to be pushed in the stroller long after he'd outgrown it.

Two completely different children, with two completely different needs--both honored using the same strategies, adapted to each child.

The only thing that stayed the same between my two kids was that I nursed them both for 3.5 years each. Yes--they were almost four when I weaned them. They were eating regular meals and on solid food. My daughter never saw a bottle; she moved straight to sippy cups of milk. My son did see a bottle--I pumped a bit for him because I worked a little when he was around six months old. He solved that by reverse cycling, which meant most of his nursing happened at night--co-sleeping for the win. But by around a year old, he was drinking cow's milk from sippy cups just like his sister.

Nursing a toddler isn't the same as nursing an infant. They nurse when you come in the door. They nurse before bed. Maybe in the morning before you leave for work--but that's it. That's all the nursing there is.

What do they get from that? A nutrition boost during the toddler picky-eater phase. Immune support from my body. But mostly, it's comfort. It's a reconnection, a knowing that mom is there and the relationship is still solid. It helps when they don't feel well, or when they're overstimulated. It makes moving through those toddler years much easier than usual.

Would I do it again if I were to have another child?

In a heartbeat.

There's so much noise out there about sleep-training, not spoiling, and self-soothing. While these things are sold as good ideas, what they often create is disconnection. What's fascinating is how many parents

spend those early years pushing for independence in a child who isn't ready--only to panic when that independence shows up full force in the teenage years. They spend childhood laying the tracks, then try to derail the train when it starts to move. But when you build connection first--real, steady, nervous-system-deep connection--independence doesn't need to be forced. It comes on its own. And when it does, it's not rebellion. It's maturity.

I haven't had rules in years. My kids are 15 and 22 now. They don't swear. They don't drink. They're not out late. My daughter only started dating in the last year. They don't have attitude issues. They don't do any of the things other parents seem to struggle with.

Why?

Because I didn't force independence on them before they were ready. My belief is simple: when a child doesn't have to defend their need for closeness, they eventually choose independence on their own. And when that choice is theirs, it comes from maturity--not rebellion.

Not all children are the same. Their needs won't be the same. Some will cling, some will push away. Some will want the stroller. Some will want your arms. But there is one thing that's the same across every child: they want to know that their parent will honor who they are--not try to shape them into something else. They want to know their needs will be met--not just physically, but emotionally, spiritually, relationally. And meeting those needs isn't about feeding and clothing them or setting up rules to keep them in line. It's about giving them the connection they want with you--not the connection you want to have with them.

If we allowed our kids to be clingy...

If we co-slept...

If we didn't wean from breastfeeding at six months just because some parenting guru said it was time...

If we honored biology instead of fake psychology...

We'd have healthier, happier, more independent children.

It doesn't mean I did everything right all the time. But I know what I didn't do: I didn't buy into the culture that says a one-year-old has to be independent.

They're not mini adults. They're children.

And they deserve to be children--while having their needs met by the people who love them.

I did all this before I understood radical freedom, existentialism, or spirituality.

I did all this before I began my own healing journey.

I did all this while I was still insecure and worried about what other people thought.

My rebellion was quiet.

But I live the proof every day--because I have kids who don't need me to manage their behavior. They learned how to do it themselves.

Because I honored them as children.

And now, they respect me in return.

Systems exist because we agree to them. They wouldn't exist without people, because they aren't part of the natural rhythm of the Universe. Systems are how humans organize themselves around agreed-upon ideas. They facilitate resource distribution and create structure--all the things people need to feel comfortable and safe in their lives.

Somewhere along the way, people were taught to take on the identity of the systems they live within. They become their morals, values, political ideology, or religion. Instead of being opinions they hold, or ideas they've chosen to structure their lives around, these things become egoic identities--and reasons to label people who don't agree as bad or wrong.

The problem isn't that people have their own opinions and ideas about how things should be; it's that they try to project those ideas onto the people around them. We live in a world where everybody tries to make everybody else live the way they do. We hold strong judgments about people who don't live the way we want them to. This is what creates the tension and division we see in the world today.

The power behind those arguments comes from identification. When someone doesn't agree with your view on abortion, for example, it's interpreted as a personal judgment or attack on that belief, instead of simply what it is--a difference of opinion. Because these opinions have become identities, they're defended the same way we defend our physical selves. That identification is what makes people react as if a disagreement were a personal attack.

The truth is, we no longer need shared beliefs in order to survive as a group. We are no longer in caves, fighting bears, and struggling to survive harsh winters. The system of resource distribution has created sufficient access to food, clothing, and shelter. It's not equal access, but it's reasonable access for the vast majority of people--we don't have to hunt to eat; we go to the grocery store. We don't live in caves; we have temperature-controlled homes. Agreeing on whether this access is equitable or not doesn't affect its ability to provide the grocery store with food for you to buy. We don't need shared agreement for this system to work.

The same is true of religion. We don't all need to believe in God to survive as a society. Shared moral beliefs are also unnecessary. The systems of food, clothing, shelter, healthcare, and education can run without our agreement. This remains true because those systems are currently running just fine with no agreement from anybody.

The democratic political system is subject to the same problem. It's meant to allow for differences in

opinion. We're supposed to vote, and the winner is whatever the majority believes. But there are a couple of problems with democracy.

First, it's not really a majority when less than 50% of eligible voters actually vote. It's the majority of a minority of people, which means that whatever the true majority of voters agree on is not what ends up happening. That creates disenfranchisement and apathy.

Second, democracy doesn't offer a place for outliers--it excludes them entirely. That means there's always a segment of the population that never really gets their voices heard or acted upon. In truth, this problem isn't just for outliers; it's true for the conservative right in general.

If you think back in time, progress is--very broadly--a leftist ideology. The conservative platform as a whole tries to keep things the same: if it worked in 1900, it can work now. Why change it? To gain the progress we have over the last 125 years, politics has stayed generally left. That has largely excluded the political right from the conversation.

What happens when we stop acknowledging one or more groups of people? They get mad. They act out. They become disenfranchised. They disengage. If or when they gain power, they use it to the fullest extent possible to try to return things to a previous state.

Democracy is meant to offer a balanced system, but it can't really do that without 100% of eligible voters participating in every election. Without an artificial balance through mandatory voting, democracy quickly fails due to the unintended exclusion of large segments of the population.

Contrary to popular belief, voting isn't the solution, because voting offers limited choices. You either vote on the options available or dedicate your entire life to trying to make the options you want available to others. That's a high price to pay just to be heard--and to have a choice.

So how do we fix the problems?

We first have to acknowledge that human identification with these systems is unnecessary and increasingly harmful--not only to individuals but to the systems themselves.

We play many roles in our lives--through our careers, families, friendships, and in our religious and political lives. The key is that they are roles. They are not who we are. They're things we do because we enjoy them, or because they help us surround ourselves with people who think or feel the same way we do. They create a sense of community and acceptance.

When we can maintain separation between the role we play and who we are as individuals, our individuality becomes the natural priority. The role is then a secondary thing we do for ourselves. That is as it should be. The opposite--over-identification with a role--becomes all-consuming. We lose ourselves in the very thing that was meant to bring us joy.

Systemic release, for an individual, looks like letting go of the need for identification with a given belief or ideology--to return to a sovereign individual who has opinions and beliefs that help structure their life. Without identification, we can let people be--live as they choose, be who they are--with no need to change them simply because their way of being feels like an affront to ours. We don't have to be offended by the lifestyle or beliefs of another person, regardless of how extreme those things might seem.

Politics and religion require our participation, but they don't require our identification. We can remain active in those communities and still retain a sense of self that isn't based on them. Systemic release frees the individual to be who they are, not who the system identified them as.

The system wants you to identify with it because that's how it traps you in roles--through expectations. When you focus on meeting those expectations, you forget that you don't have to agree to the system.

It doesn't mean you have to rebel; it means you have to remember that you can choose how much of yourself you give to it.

Your participation in the system is largely a choice. When you free yourself from the need to participate in politics, religion, or even shared societal values, you give yourself permission to be true to yourself instead of the system.

That's power the system doesn't want you to remember you have--because if you remember, you'll step away. And that's dangerous to a system that's just trying to survive.

Truth, responsibility, acceptance, and freedom are powerful words. If you understand what they mean and how to use them to heal yourself, they can change not only your life but also the trajectory of society itself.

**\*\*What is Truth?\***

Truth is not human rules. It is not the story you tell of blame, shame, guilt, or victimization. It is not morality or religion. Truth goes beyond human perception, feelings, and thoughts. It is deeper than that. To find truth, you have to walk away from the things you've been taught about how life is supposed to work, what your life is supposed to look like, and who you were told you are.

Human rules and perception cause more pain than the original experience offers. The original experience is contained to a time and place. It is finite, with a beginning and an end. Once the experience is over, it is no longer generating pain--which means that everything that happens after it is up to you.

The pain can be limited to just your initial reaction because that part is not under conscious control. The automatic pain response is pre-programmed, usually based on the stories we tell, our previous experiences, and our judgment of what happened.

At some point after the experience, we can begin to regain control over our thinking. Here we decide whether to add more pain by telling stories or to let the pain flow through unencumbered--by not adding any additional stories to our memory of the event. From this place of no longer adding to the experience, we can find truth.

Every experience offers you tools you can use to heal. If you are too busy telling stories about the experience or wallowing in the pain, you will miss these tools. In short, the tools are the truth of the experience. They show how your own interpretation causes you pain and reveal a different way to see the experience--one that frees you instead of trapping you. The truth is where freedom from the pain is found.

**\*\*What is Responsibility?\***

Responsibility is something we choose to do or take on in our external world. It is meant to be a choice that can be changed at any time.

Society turns responsibility into a trap by conflating it with obligation. Obligation is internal. It is something you do within yourself, for yourself, by yourself. The only true obligation you have in life is to yourself. Everything outside of you is a chosen responsibility that you are free to walk away from at any time.

The system wants you to believe that once you take on a responsibility, you're not allowed to walk away. That's a lie. It's a fear-based form of control built on the idea that chaos would follow if everyone simply chose their responsibilities without external consequences. This is what perpetuates the system of reward and punishment on which society rests.

**\*\*What is Acceptance?\***

Acceptance is the ability to allow things to be as they are without trying to fix or change them. It is complicated by the human story of how things should be. We tell ourselves that the experience should not have happened--but that's not true. If the experience shouldn't have happened, it wouldn't have. If it happened, then it was supposed to.

Our judgment of the experience as something unwanted or bad doesn't mean it wasn't supposed to occur. We may not want it to happen--and that's reasonable--but the idea that it shouldn't have happened is untrue and causes additional pain.

Often we simply accept an experience as a thing that happened outside our control. We can't change it, make it go away, or prevent it. We have to make peace with it so it can exist without hurting us further.

That's a tall order when the experience directly affects you and causes pain. Pain, while usually unwanted, isn't necessarily bad. It can be a beautiful teacher. Pain can show you your own perceptions. When you learn to use pain as a tool, you stop needing to avoid it, and it becomes easier to accept experience as just something that happens.

**\*\*What is Freedom?\***

Radical freedom is the ability to make your own choices--including choices other people don't like, choices that have been made illegal, and choices that are considered morally or religiously wrong.

Radical freedom is the truth. Limitation is the lie. Limitation arises from fear and a need for control. By keeping people contained and limiting individual freedom, society tries to protect people from each other. The intention may have been to hold society together through shared morality, but the reality is painful.

The limits on individual freedom came from misinterpreting truth, responsibility, and acceptance. When those are seen through a clear lens, there is no need to limit freedom. Experience is accepted; truth is sought and found; responsibility is a choice instead of a constraint.

When truth, responsibility, acceptance, and freedom are taken on cleanly by the individual, life changes. People are freed from the perpetual sense of limitation and lack that society offers. When everyone feels fully supported and no longer has to struggle to survive, life becomes easier, freedom is far less threatening, and fear subsides.

The goal is not to create chaos for the sake of chaos. The goal is to free people from the pain they have trapped themselves in, while giving them the freedom to make choices that align with their truth, their sense of responsibility, and their ability to accept experience as simply something that happens.

I wrote my way to the clarity and truth I have now. Most philosophers do the same thing. They write to find truth.

When I look at philosophical texts, I see where they got stuck in the human rules, in their own stories and perceptions, and I understand how incredibly difficult it is to challenge those things.

Many times, I question how much these old philosophers were able to fully live their philosophies. Kierkegaard, for example, did live his philosophy--at the expense of everything else. Why? Because he lived it in secret. He hid, avoided relationships, all but dodged life to maintain integrity with his philosophy.

The problem that many have is that the philosophy becomes the justification for their life choices. They end up in a mental loop where their philosophy justifies their choices, and their choices justify their philosophy. Even if it creates pain, they accept that as the consequence of living life the way they've conceptualized it. Kierkegaard believed that the pain he felt was the point. The pain was the point of the human experience. The pain justified his philosophy.

Kierkegaard, Sartre, Jung, Camus, and many others brought messages to life that they felt would help the world. How closely they were able to align with and live by those messages varies from person to person. What is true for all of them is that they used writing to understand themselves and their lives. Their writing and philosophies reflect their own personal pain and struggle.

Right or wrong, those philosophies helped to shape the course of history. To some degree, they've shaped my perception of the world as well. Their philosophies are still debated and talked about in classrooms and online forums the world over. Whether or not we agree with what they wrote, they are shaping human perspectives to this day.

For my own small part in this play we call life, I've endeavored to find the loops, the patterns, the sticking points, and the struggles. Where human rules limited a philosophy, it was the human rule that was the problem, not the philosophy. By breaking the human rules, most of these philosophies can be lived quite freely.

The concept of absurdity that Camus brought forth has a lot of truth to it. Meaning is ours to create through our perception. Realizing this created a conundrum for Camus, because if experience has no inherent meaning and it's ours to create, then what's the point of experience? This thought loop is what he labelled as absurdity.

I would argue that the experience itself is the point of the experience. Why does there need to be a greater purpose? If you believe in it, then maybe Universal expansion can be the reason for experience-- but if not, then the experience serves as its own justification. You could take it a step further and argue that what you gain from the experience is the point of the experience. Pain isn't all that can be gotten from an experience. There is plenty of truth to be found in even the most painful of experiences, if you're willing to look for it.

Camus, through his philosophy of absurdity, ended up examining his own painful perceptions and

questions around why we're here. He was never able to answer his own question. He got tied up in his own thought loop. This is the reason for the writing. This is what makes his writing more meaningful. This is what gives the philosophy power. He lived it, and he tried to solve it. But solving it wasn't the point. The conundrum was enough to take him on a powerful journey of experience. Those experiences shaped who he was and how he lived. There is plenty of power in that, whether he got stuck or not.

I'm sharing this because I see myself in their work. Not because I have some amazing philosophical framework to share, but because I recognize the power of what they were doing through their work. It's something I do with my own work as a writer. I write to find truth, and I find truth to write. That's what they did. In doing so, they shaped millions of people's lives and perspectives, including my own.

For that, I am truly grateful for the work they did.

In parenting, it looks like swearing like a pirate while telling your kids not to. Or demanding they get off their screens while you keep scrolling Facebook. Or better--telling your kids not to hit while you spank them.

In politics, it looks like being told you live in a free country while being handed a list of rules you didn't ask for. It looks like "free speech" that isn't really free, because there are still things you're not allowed to say.

Where in your life do you live in the contradiction?  
 Where do you say one thing and do the opposite?  
 Where do your beliefs conflict with the way you actually live?

If there's a contradiction, then something isn't true.

Let's be real--there's plenty of grey area in life. Something isn't always hot or cold--it's warm. That's fine. Grey areas are part of the deal.

We just have to make sure we actually see the grey for what it is.

Not pretend it's clear when it isn't. Not call it truth when it's actually contradiction.

I remember when my daughter was little, I believed in the idea of a bedtime.  
 But can you actually make somebody sleep? Have you tried?  
 How'd that go for you?

Because I couldn't make her sleep, the idea of a bedtime was pointless--it wasn't accomplishing the intended goal. So I shifted to "quiet time."

Go in your room and hang out.

I can't make you go to sleep, but I can make you go away.

By the time she was around 6 or 7, I gave up altogether.

I never enforced a bedtime with my son. I began to trust their natural instincts for knowing when to go to sleep. The natural consequence of not getting enough is that you're tired the next day.

I can explain that: the consequence of being tired, and how to fix it.

But I can't explain why I force you to go to bed while I stay up late.

I can't explain why I'm allowed to swear or hit and you're not.

I can explain why you're not allowed to drive, vote, or drink--those rules are outside of my control. But everything within my control will not live in contradiction.

Over the last few years, I've been wrestling with those contradictions in my work. Marketing is a contradiction. If I tell you that you need something because you're broken or there's something wrong with you, it doesn't honor your sovereignty. It contradicts the belief that none of us is broken.

If I tell you I'm right and you're wrong, then I'm engaging in the fight and judging your ideas. That's a contradiction with non-judgment.

If I tell you how to live, that's in contradiction with radical freedom, which allows you the freedom to do whatever you want, even if I wouldn't do it myself.

To stay out of the contradiction, I can't prescribe anything--and I can't judge anything. I have to allow all of it to simply be okay.

That shifts the tone of my work.

It means I don't sell anything.

It means I'm simply sharing my lived experience or my philosophy with you.

If you agree, fine.

If you don't, fine.

I'm not making my way of being better than yours.

I'm just sharing what my way of being is.

From this space, I'm not here to be a guru or a guide.

I'm only sharing the truth I've found for myself--with you.

It's not a contradiction to put the paid work out there.

It's only a contradiction if I tell you that you need it because there is something wrong with you.

It's not a contradiction to share what I think, feel, or believe.

It's only a contradiction if I tell you that you have to believe it too.

It's been an internal war to get to this place--

to fully drop "the system" that says I'm supposed to do certain things,

just so I can live in integrity with what I know to be true.

Why was it so hard?

Because not living within the system requires sacrifice--especially in your work.

There are no quick wins.

No viral content.

No marketing machine.

No ads.

No pressure.

No slimy sales tactics.

None of the things the world tells you you need to be successful.

There is only me--  
 putting my work out into the world,  
 not telling anybody what I did,  
 and then hoping it finds its way  
 to the people who want to read it.

It meant letting go of the part of my dream that still included the system--  
 and the rewards it promises:  
 best-selling books,  
 big houses,  
 fancy cars.

It doesn't mean I have to live in lack.  
 That's a manufactured lie, too.

The Cambridge Quarterly of Healthcare Ethics published an article in its journal titled [The Transplant Trolley Problem](<https://www.cambridge.org/core/journals/cambridge-quarterly-of-healthcare-ethics/article/transplant-trolley-problem/A2EB60059D7119DC0F2649918054F617>) in 2022 written by Robert Osorio and Guillermo Palchik.

The article compares the life of a transplant surgeon to **[[The Trolley Problem]]**, a philosophical moral debate. The premise of the Trolley Problem is that there is a set of train tracks that branches into two separate tracks. You're standing at the lever that determines which way the train goes. A runaway train is coming down the track, and at the end of each branch there are people trapped. One track has one person trapped; the other has five. Do you pull the lever or not?

In the article, the authors compare the scarcity of available organs to the runaway train, and the choice of which patients receive those organs to the lever. Every choice the surgeon makes is framed as akin to pulling the lever--or choosing not to.

The Philosophy of Integration asks a very specific question in relation to this problem:

**Why is scarcity treated as a natural, immutable moral condition instead of a system-level failure?**

Doctors are not personally responsible for the supply and demand of transplant organs. They are not part of the supply-and-demand chain. If we were talking about a car part shortage, we wouldn't blame the mechanic for not being able to get the parts needed to fix the car. Transplant surgeons are like car mechanics--they only have access to what's available in the system behind them. Their only real choice is to decide who is best served by the parts on hand.

It's not a moral dilemma.

It's a logic problem -- the system is incoherent.

The system has been designed to create these artificial moral problems. The problem only exists because of how the story is framed. The so-called moral dilemma dissolves the moment you notice that the structure itself created the crisis. A train does not naturally split itself between two groups of people placed conveniently along its path. The scenario is built to trap the observer into believing there are only two options when, in reality, the dilemma is entirely manufactured by the conditions of the thought experiment.

The system the surgeon works within is built on exactly the same premise. The dilemma only exists because the system created it. The systemic shortage is not the doctor's moral dilemma any more than there is a moral dilemma for the person standing beside the lever of the train tracks. It's an artificial choice based on

systemic lack and a false moral ideology.

Instead of questioning the structure that created the scarcity, the article elevates the surgeon into the position of a philosophical lever-puller. This is the same distortion that appears in countless moral problems: the assumption that individuals must make ethically impossible decisions because "that's just how the world is." But the world isn't inherently structured around moral trains. Systems are.

Scarcity is not how the world works. Scarcity is the result of systems that create it artificially and then try to impose impossible choices on the people closest to the proverbial levers.

Scarcity is incoherent. It creates a distorted chain of cause and effect that cannot be resolved by surgeons or car mechanics facing ethically impossible choices.

Incoherence is not the natural state of the world. The world has a simple, coherent structure of cause and effect underlying every experience we have. When a chain is not created by the individual coming into contact with it, that individual is not responsible for that chain. Any interference with that chain creates additional fragmentation, incoherence, or further problems.

Because surgeons continue to defend their impossible choices, the cause-and-effect loop continues to repeat itself. If the surgeons simply focused on the idea that the system is incoherent and that it is not their moral dilemma to solve, they could extract themselves from the cause-and-effect chain they find themselves tangled up in.

Why are these surgeons questioning their impossible choices instead of questioning the system that created them?

We have been conditioned to treat systems as something we simply have to deal with--like dealing with the weather--so we don't question where the problem originated. Who created the problem? Why does the problem exist in the first place? Who is responsible for fixing it?

The truth is that the problem will never be fixed. Transplant surgeons will forever find themselves faced with ridiculous choices because the system has tricked them into believing that it's their problem to solve.

The system has created its own "solution" to the problem by offering doctors criteria for how to choose who gets an organ and who doesn't. Everything from lifestyle, age, money, and overall health becomes the metric through which the value of human life is determined. If you're fat or 80 or broke or already sick, you're not considered important enough to receive an organ.

The surgeons don't question this. They don't seem to see the problem with a system that asks them to do this. Since when is any system -- or any human being -- qualified enough to decide which life is worth keeping and which isn't? This isn't medicine. It's not how medicine works. But it is a prime example of systemic failure and how systemic failure shows up in human life.

There may be a day in the future when technology and funding catch up, simplifying criteria, lowering rejection rates, and removing financial barriers from the process. What the article accidentally shows is that the problem is solvable, which means it is not an eternal moral dilemma -- it's the temporary problem of a broken system.

If the problem is solvable through technology and funding, then it's no longer a moral dilemma for

doctors to solve. The problem is created through the same distortion as the Trolley Problem: it's a false choice. It's a chain with a solution that hasn't yet been realized. That means the solution to the chain of cause and effect is not available to the doctors. The doctors are not the solution to the problem. The system is its own solution to its own chain of cause and effect.

The system creates a supposed real-life Trolley Problem for the doctors because it refuses to fix its own problem. But it's not a moral failure of the doctors, who are simply making the best choices they can with the information they have. It's not even a moral failure of the system, because the system was never designed to be moral. A moral dilemma is only "real" if it exists independently of a failing system--which this doesn't. The transplant world doesn't prove the Trolley Problem is real. It proves that systems built on scarcity force people into false binary choices.

The problem will disappear when the system chooses to fix itself. Until doctors, like these transplant surgeons, focus on the true problem instead of making themselves participants in a story they didn't write, the cause-and-effect chain will continue to loop endlessly. To collapse a cause-and-effect chain, it must be seen clearly and walked away from. The doctors have the capacity to do that once they make the choice to see it clearly.

When the movement becomes the state, the Ladder culminates in freedom.

At this stage, the Axis is effortless -- Creation and Reflection flow without conflict.

> \*\*The Axis is the heartbeat.

> The Ladder is the maturation.

> Integration is the field they create.\*\*

## ## \*\*Integration Thread\*\*

The Ladder of Integration describes **internal conditions** -- safety, awareness, truth, responsibility, choice, coherence, freedom.

The Axis of Awareness describes **internal movement** --

Creation (what you put into the loop) and Reflection (what the loop returns).

These two systems are not separate.

They are one structure seen from two angles:

- The Axis shows the \_daily movement\_ of the self.

- The Ladder shows the long-term evolution of the self.
- Cause and Effect shows the world's response to the self.

This thread reveals:

- why you can't skip rungs on the Ladder
- why you can revisit rungs without regressing
- why the Axis fails when safety is compromised
- why the Ladder stabilizes what the Axis begins
- why coherence is the natural endpoint of any system that stops resisting truth

> **People don't improve through effort -- they integrate through repetition without fear.**

### ## **\*\*Principle\*\***

Cause and effect does not guarantee that events are meaningful, deserved, or reflective.

It describes continuity -- not justice.

Some events arise from complexity, randomness, or conditions far beyond any individual's influence.

Integration does not turn tragedy into lesson or suffering into symbolism.

It simply reveals how we meet the world after something has already occurred.

---

### ## **\*\*1. Cause and Effect Is Continuity, Not Purpose\*\***

Events unfold within a relational field, but that does not mean they unfold for someone.

Cause and effect describes chains, conditions, and interactions -- the movement of reality from one moment to the next. It does not assign purpose, intention, or cosmic instruction.

Reality continues, but it does not arrange itself around personal narratives.

---

### ## **\*\*2. Randomness Within Lawfulness\*\***

Even in a lawful universe, randomness exists.

Accidents, sudden losses, disasters, and tragedies arise from vast, intersecting forces that have nothing to do with individual meaning or moral logic.

The field is coherent as a whole, yet often incoherent to the person inside the event.

Lawfulness does not imply intimacy.

It simply means that nothing happens outside the movement of reality -- not that everything happens for a reason.

---

### ## **\*\*3. Suffering Without Symbolism\*\***

Some suffering carries no deeper pattern.

Its only truth is that it happened.

Integration does not ask anyone to decode tragedy, reinterpret pain as gift, or search for hidden messages inside grief.

Meaning may arise later, but it is never required.

Meeting pain honestly is enough.

---

## \*\*4. Reflection Happens \_After\_, Not \_Because\_\*\*

Cause and effect is not a curriculum.

It does not create circumstances to teach or correct.

Reflection belongs to awareness -- not to the event itself.

An event unfolds because conditions allowed it; awareness interprets it because the mind seeks orientation.

When awareness becomes coherent, reflection becomes clearer.

But the reflection is ours, not the universe's.

---

## \*\*5. Tragedy Is Not Distortion\*\*

Fear, grief, and overwhelm during catastrophe are not signs of fragmentation -- they are accurate responses to unbearable conditions.

The body does not lie about danger or loss.

Integration becomes possible only when safety, time, or support soften the intensity enough for coherence to return.

Nothing in this philosophy expects grace during freefall.

---

## \*\*6. The Path Through the Unbearable\*\*

Integration offers no reframing of catastrophe and no justification for harm.

It offers a way of re-entering life after the impact -- a way of meeting reality again without collapsing under the story of what should have happened.

It does not ask us to grow from suffering.

It asks us to return to ourselves when we can.

> \*\*Integration does not tell you why it happened.

> It helps you see where you stand now that it has.\*\*
